

Plouf! mixed media 10 x 13"






Joy of the Lord mixed media

Nehemiah 8:10 Do not sorrow, for the joy of the Lord is your strength.




Ye Vipers, Ye Snakes mixed media, left 17 x 21"


I Will Lift up Mine Eyes mixed media, right 30 x 35"


Aleph mixed media, left 14 x 17" each mixed media, right 30 x 35"








Beitmixed media, left 14 x 17" each mixed media, right 30 x 35"

Kaf mixed media, left 14 x 17" each mixed media, right 30 x 35"



However, outcomes can be surprising. I leapt ahead to "Kaf" because Steve wanted me to do something "blue." Well, we tried!








Each finished piece is preceded by an under-painting. The painted structure for "Beit" was starting to look pretty good. I was sad to cover it over, and rather missed it. So I decided, once I had the design for the piece, that this time I would have it scanned onto a canvas. I used the copy for the piecing of the fabric, and finished the painting on the original. After the "final" painting was scanned, I decided that the spiral on the right needed some red to orange in the opposite direction of the left spirals. Things are always evolving.




Stranger




Honk! mixed media 30 x 35"


Lary Oil/mixed media 12 x 18"

My Lost Hat Oil/mixed media


